Belmar is a lovely town populated by many permanent residents, as well as vacationers that wish they could call Belmar their home. Unlike many vacation destinations, Belmar does not become a ghost town during the winter, but continues to be a thriving, active, center of commerce and family activity all year round.

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
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# globalvoyagers marine mammal stranding center can use a hand

k. You love marine mammals (well maybe not the type that have sharp teeth and eat people). But if the sight of a stranded or injured dolphin sinks your heart, a volunteer for the Marine Mammal Stranding Center in Brigantine may be just the fix vou need.

And the best part is that you don't have to live near Brigantine ... just as long as you are within 15 minutes of the Jersey Shore. You must go to the center to fill out a volunteer application. Age requirement is 18 years old. They do not accept applications by mail or via the internet.

"The Marine Mammal Stranding Center depends heavily on volunteers to assist our three-person stranding staff," said Robert Schoelkopf, founder and director of the center. "Volunteers assist with fundraising events, museum tours, and/or protecting stranded seals on the beach until we arrive. We are responsible for 1,800 miles of coastline in the State of New Jersey and local volunteers along the beaches are invaluable for immediately responding to strandings at locations distant from our center in Brigantine."

When a stranding occurs on any beach in New Jersey, a staff member will call stranding volunteers in that area. The volunteer should immediately go to the location of the animal where they can "size up" the situation and notify the center of what degree of action is required. The volunteer will receive specific instructions on what to do until a stranding center staff member arrives at the scene (a cell phone is very helpful in these situations). The volunteer then stays with the animal until the staff arrives, and continues to assist in loading the animal into the vehicle. Stranding volunteers must attend a workshop to give them basic knowledge of what is to be expected.

Other volunteer positions for people who live near Brigantine include pool house volunteers (scrubbing and cleaning animal tanks, equipment, and floors), museum volunteers, fund-raising volunteers and festival volunteers.

# earth-friendly-coffee

What is organic coffee? Organic coffee is grown using methods and materials that have a low impact on the environment. Organic production systems replenish and maintain soil fertility, reduce the use of toxic and persistent pesticides and fertilizers, and build biologically diverse agriculture. Third-party certification organizations verify that organic farmers abide by the law.

What does it mean to be certified organic?

In order for coffee to be certified and sold as organic in the United States, it must be produced in accordance with U.S. standards for organic production and certified by an agency accredited by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. U.S. requirements for organic coffee production include farming without synthetic pesticides or other prohibited substances for three years and a sustainable crop rotation plan to

prevent erosion, the depletion of soil nutrients, and control for pests.

# What is the size of the U.S. organic coffee market?

Organic Trade Association data shows that organic coffee sales in the United States amounted to approximately \$110 million in 2006, up 24 percent from the previous year. Other studies show the figure could be much higher. A 2007 survey by Daniele Giovannucci and the Costa Rica-based Sustainable Markets Intelligence Center reported that approximately 65 million pounds of organic coffee were imported into the United States in 2006 with a retail value of approximately \$617 million.

# Where is organic coffee grown?

Organic coffee is grown in 40 countries including Bolivia, Burundi, Brazil, Cameroon, China, Colombia, Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Ethiopia, Ghana, Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras, India, Indonesia, Kenya, Lao PDR, Madagascar, Malawi, Mexico, Nepal, Nicaragua, Panama, Peru, Philippines, Rwanda, Sri Lanka, Thailand, Timore-Leste, Togo, Trinidad and Tobago, Uganda, United Republic of Tanzania, United States (Hawaii), Venezuela, Vietnam, and Zambia. The leading producer countries are Peru, USDA

Ethiopia, and Mexico. What organic coffee products are in the marketplace?

Organic coffee products now on the market include decaffeinated, caffeinated, flavored and instant coffees, organic coffee ice cream and voghurt, coffee sodas, hard candies, and

chocolate covered beans. How is organic coffee decaffeinated?

Most conventionally produced coffees are decaffeinated by using toxic solvents such as methylene chloride (probable human carcinogen, harmful to central nervous system) or ethyl acetate (harmful to central nervous system, kidneys and liver). Organic coffee, however, must be decaffeinated using a certified organic decaffeination process to maintain the organic integrity of the beans. One of the most popular organic decaffeination processes is the SWISS WATER process, using only water to remove caffeine.

> What labels might you see on organic coffee and what do they mean?

The USDA organic seal can appear on any coffee product that contains at least 95 percent organic ingredients and that has been certified as organic by a certification agency accredited by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The coffee may also carry a label saying "100 percent organic" or "Organic."

# Fair Trade

Alliance

Fair Trade certification focuses on labor and trade standards to provide small-farmer co-operatives a guaranteed price above the conventional market. Not all Fair Trade Certifiedä coffee is necessarily organic. However, Fair Trade Certified does require strict environmental stewardship such as prohibiting the use of genetically modified organisms and the most hazardous pesticides. Seventy-eight percent of all Fair Trade Certified coffee sold in the United States is certified organic.

# **Bird Friendly**

Bird Friendly can only be used by operators that meet inspection and certification requirements of the Smithsonian Migratory Bird Center. All certified Bird Friendly coffee must also be certified organic. Bird Friendly certification requires that the coffee be shade-grown with a wide variety of native shade trees and other shade-providing species. No synthetic chemicals

can be used in the processing of Bird Friendly coffee. For information on other eco-labels that may appear on organic coffee, see www. eco-labels.org. — Organic Trade Association 🛎



# **W** started How To Live in 1993.

was 35, unmarried and highly educated in "other things". My son was 3 and looking up to me as if I should be standing for something. And so, How TO Live began ...

I am neither a sales person nor a business person. Although I have a lot of training in writing, I have none in

> drawing (well, I've taken one adult school drawing class). I know I had a good idea when I did the island design. But , honestly, a lot of people have aood ideas.

I do believe that an idea is just a door. You have to open that door and walk and walk through it and keep walking.

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

# guiding LIGHT Cape May Light — bringing sailors safely home since 1859

This 157-foot-high lighthouse is still an aid to navigation. Visitors who climb the 199 steps to the top of the lighthouse are rewarded with a spectacular panoramic view of the scenic Cape May peninsula. The first known lighthouse at Cape May was built in 1823. By 1847 a new lighthouse was erected on a high bluff, however, due to the encroaching sea and poor building design it was eventually dismantled. Built in 1859, the current lighthouse used the original bricks of the 1847 lighthouse. For info on tours and hours of operation call The Mid Atlantic Center for the Arts at 609-884-5404. Admission to the lighthouse is \$5.00 for adults and \$1.00 for children 12 and under. - *NJDEP* **≛** 



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Board of Public Utilities approves exploring off-shore wind development in New Jersey

The Board of Public Utilities today unanimously approved an offshore wind competitive grant solicitation with up to \$19 million in funding to support the financing and development of an offshore wind pilot. As part of this funding the Board will provide up to 10 percent of the total incentive upfront to help conduct the needed studies and prepare needed permit applications. Governor Jon Corzine has committed his Administration to aggressively pursuing clean, renewable energy sources for New Jersey's electricity supply. As a part of his overall renewable energy strategy, the Governor directed his Administration to explore the possibility of offshore wind, which has significant potential along the New Jersey coastline. The successful grant will build an aggregate capacity of up to 350 MW of offshore renewable wind electricity. This capacity represents enough electricity to power approximately 125,000 homes. The Board will accept proposals for funding up to and including January 16, 2008, with the award projected for March of 2008. As time went on, we expanded to include exotic and domestic animals. All our residents once faced these circumstances, as well as exploitation and illegal ownership. Over 200 of these animals and birds now live in spacious surroundings in the heart of the scenic Pine Barrens in southern New Jersey. # Subway Cars hit bottom on Atlantic City reef

This past spring, 44 decommissioned stainless steel subway cars were deployed on the Atlantic City Reef site as part of the Artificial Reef Program. The AC reef is located 8.8 nautical miles offshore of the Absecon Inlet, has a depth range of 50 - 90 feet and is four square miles in size. Also located on the AC reef are Redbird subway cars, concrete, reef balls, telecommunication cables, army tanks, tires and various vessels all of which total just under 65,000 cubic yards of reef material. Three locations were

chosen to be the final resting place for these particular subway cars. Site one consists of 15 cars, located at DGPS coordinates 3915.600' 7414.400', in depth range of 75 - 80 feet. Site two consists of 14 cars, located at DGPS coordinates 3915.375' 7414.625', in depth range of 75 - 80 feet. The third and final site with 15 cars is located at DGPS coordinates 3914.100' 7412.600', in depth range of 90 - 95 feet. The cars are placed in a tight circle pattern surrounding these coordinates to better accommodate divers. A total of 600 decommissioned stainless steel subway cars are to be deployed eventually, all being received from the New York Metropolitan Transit Authority (MTA). Each car is approximately 60 feet in length, 10 feet in width and 11 feet in height. Prior to deployment each car is stripped of all plastics, degradable materials and grease to avoid contamination to the marine ecosystem. The MTA covers all costs for the cleaning,



transportation and deployment to the artificial reef sites. The remainder of the cars are scheduled to be deployed at the Deepwater, Cape May, Garden State North and Shark River Reef sites. — *NJ Division of Fish & Wildlife*

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



# Kon Tiki — an adventure worth checking out

on-Tiki was the raft used by Norwegian explorer and writer Thor Heyerdahl in his 1947 expedition across the Pacific Ocean from South America to the Polynesian islands. It was named after the Inca sun god, Viracocha, for whom "Kon-Tiki" was said to be an old name. Kon-Tiki is also the name of the popular book that Heyerdahl wrote about his adventures. Heyerdahl believed that people from South America could have settled Polynesia in pre-Columbian times. His aim in mounting the Kon-Tiki expedition was to show, by using only the materials and technologies available to those people at the time, that there were no technical reasons to prevent them from having done so.
